# GENERAL RULES AND INSTRUCTIONS ALL ENTRIES MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED

## GENERAL ENTRY DUE DATE AUGUST 15, 2025

- 1. All exhibits must be produced, selected and arranged by the exhibitor during the last 12 months. Entries failing to comply with the Exhibitors Handbook requirements will be disqualified.
- 2. The committee, judge or fair management reserves the right to reject any and/or all exhibits they deem not desirable, or properly entered or are of undesirable quality. Placing will be awarded on the basis of quality of the exhibit and the decision of the judge will be final.
- 3. A person shall make only one entry per class (exception in open cattle, sheep, poultry and rabbit classes where 2 placings, per class, per breed, per exhibitor are allowed for adult divisions). In group and pair classes only one entry is allowed per exhibitor. Exhibitors must furnish their feed and bedding for animals.
- 4. EXHIBITOR STANDARDS: The fair is an educational activity. Positive social behavior, good sportsmanship and cooperation are encouraged. It is recognized that in classes of livestock exhibitors have standards of dress, which have been accepted by the industry examples are slacks (not dungarees), skirts and dresses of plain white or khaki. Farm or other names on clothing will not be allowed in the show ring. Exhibitors not conforming to the dress code will forfeit all premiums. All exhibitors (including group classes) in the show ring must be in show clothes, no bathing attire or shorts will be allowed. A solid durable shoe must be worn at all times. No sandals, sneakers, clogs or bare feet will be allowed. All exhibitors must have footwear on at all times in the barn area.
- 5. All reasonable precautions will be taken by the Society for the safe keeping of animals and articles entrusted to its care, but all exhibits are received upon the condition that: **The Society shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage** that may occur to animals or articles on exhibit for any reason. Exhibitors, contestants, and/or participants agree to be solely responsible for any loss, injury to, damage done, occasioned by arising from any exhibit, equipment, animal or person and to defend and indemnify the Society and management thereof against all claims and liability in regard thereto. In view of this understanding, exhibitors, contestants and/or participants may deem it advisable to obtain appropriate liability insurance.
- 6. In case of inclement weather, lack of attendance or other uncontrollable conditions making it necessary, the Society will pay premiums on a pro-rata basis.
- 7. No alcoholic beverages will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Exhibitors caught drinking or intoxicated will be automatically disqualified.
- 8. Please use your full name, no nicknames, address, phone number, zip code and Email address on the entry forms. Checks returned to us because of insufficient address or wrong address will be forfeited. All animal exhibitors are required to provide their social security number. Failure to provide said number will result in forfeit of all premiums.
- 9. In paying premiums, no evidence of awards will be recognized except the entry book properly signed by the judge and superintendent, as ribbons frequently become misplaced.
- 10. Any discrepancies or questions regarding premiums must be made prior to October 31 in writing to the fair secretary.
- 11. All entries must be pre-registered by August 15, 2025 using the <u>current year's entry</u> <u>forms in the back of the Premium Book.</u>
- 12. The management will consider it a favor if patrons will report any mistreatment or extortion practiced by any employee of the Fair or Concessionaires. Do not wait until the fair is over to make your complaint.
- 13. Judges may not be contenders in any amateur classes listed in their area of expertise.
- 14. It is recommended that all livestock be vaccinated for rabies.
- 15. All checks must be cashed within 90 days. Lost checks will NOT be replaced.
- 16. **Valid Registration Certificates:** The original registration certificate or association's duplicate or computer printouts (NO PHOTOCOPIES) will be considered as proof of ownership, identity, age and breeder of an entry. Electronic registration certificates are accepted and may be used by management as ownership verification. The ownership of an entry must appear on the certificate as it will be exhibited, or if owned in partnership, exhibited by one or more of the owners. In the case of an animal under one year of age, a photocopy or electronic image of the registration application with a registration number assigned by the breed association may be presented if the actual registration paper is not processed by show date. We will not accept registration transfers after the show has started. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to be

sure animals are registered properly according to their respective breed association rules. Please make sure papers are with animals.

Inspection Procedure: All gates are closed to livestock entrance or exit between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. Please plan to arrive only during the times listed in each show section, unless otherwise stated. All inspections will be done by the superintendent of each department. They have the final word of determination and management will support their decisions. There is only one superintendent per department, the pre-determined arrival hours and will remain until all animals have been checked. Health papers and official interstate health papers issued from their state of origin, and meeting MDAR Fair Animal Health Requirements must accompany animals! This means the driver or exhibitor must be in possession of the papers and remain with the animals during the entire inspection process. Arrive at fairgrounds. Show health papers. If the gate person requests, please wait patiently until directed to proceed to the next point. Show health papers. Be prepared for staff to compare the number of animals being transported with the number of animals listed on the papers. All animals being transported must be accounted for on the health papers or the driver will be asked to leave without unloading. Please contact your superintendent before attempting to unload ANY animals. No animals may unload before superintendent approval. Each animal MUST pass inspection before entering the fairgrounds or tie-out stalls. Unload as directed by the superintendent. The superintendent will inspect each animal as they unload. The superintendent initials on the health papers prove the animal has passed inspection and may be stalled/penned. If there is a waiting line, animal safety and welfare is of utmost concern. Weather (heat and humidity) may dictate the animals' need to unload before the inspection process can happen. In this case, the animals will proceed to the nearest and remain there until inspected. No animal may enter the fairgrounds or tie-out stalls before they have passed inspection

**PARKING AND PASSES** - Exhibitors other than sheep and dairy livestock will not be issued passes and must pay the regular price of admission.

**PLEASE NOTE**: The exhibitor handbook is prepared in the spring. Classes and health regulations may change following press time. Please be advised changes may take place.

#### ANIMAL HEALTH ORDER

Pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws ("M.G.L."), Chapter 129, § 2

ISSUED TO: All Individuals, entities, associations, and interested parties involved in the hosting or organization of any exhibition, show, swap or other in-person event encouraging the gathering or commingling of waterfowl.

### **INTRODUCTION**

This Order ("Order") is issued in response to the continued spread of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza ("HPAI") in domestic birds and dairy cattle across the United States.

#### **JURISDICTION**

This Order is issued under the authority vested in the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources ("MDAR") under M.G.L. c. 129, § 2.

# **PARTIES**

- 1. 1. MDAR is a duly authorized administrative agency of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts acting pursuant to the provisions of M.G.L. c. 129, § 2.
- 2. All Individuals, entities, associations, and interested parties involved in the hosting or organization of any competition, exhibition, show, swap or other in-person event in Massachusetts encouraging the gathering or commingling of waterfowl.

### **SUMMARY OF APPLICABLE LAW**

3. M.G.L. c. 129, § 1 states, in part, the following:

""Domestic animals", all animals including poultry that are kept or harbored as domesticated animals. Poultry as used in this section shall include chickens, roosters, capons, hens, turkeys, pigeons, guinea fowl, and ducks and geese other than wild species."

4. M.G.L. c. 129, § 2 states the following:

"The director may make and enforce reasonable orders, rules, and regulations relative to the following: the sanitary condition of neat cattle, other ruminants and swine and of places where such animals are kept; the prevention, suppression and extirpation of contagious diseases of domestic animals; the establishing of disease-

free herds of cattle and the issuing of certificates in connection therewith; the inspection, examination, quarantine, care and treatment or destruction of domestic animals affected with or which have been exposed to contagious disease, the burial or disposal of their carcasses, and the cleansing and disinfection of places where contagion exists or has existed. No rules or regulations shall take effect until approved by the governor and council."

### **FINDINGS OF FACT**

- 5. HPAI is a highly contagious disease that affects both domestic and wild birds. This disease is deadly to many species of domestic birds and the spread of HPAI in domestic flocks may lead to interstate and international trade restrictions. Therefore, the prevention of the spread of the disease is of utmost importance to the residents and agricultural businesses located within the Commonwealth.
- 6. Since 2022, HPAI has been detected in multiple counties across the Commonwealth in both wild birds and domestic flocks. In 2024, Avian Influenza infections were detected in dairy cattle in multiple states. Recent data suggests that currently circulating avian influenza virus strains may be capable of infecting additional species. Contact with wild waterfowl or areas where they congregate is directly or indirectly linked to all domestic poultry detections in New England.
- 7. The gathering of waterfowl from different premises to a central location increases the risk of disease spread.
- 8. Animal Health Officials from all six New England States are recommending all competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps or other in-person events encouraging the gathering or commingling of waterfowl be cancelled through the end of 2025.

# **ORDER**

NOW THEREFORE, based upon the above knowledge and information, the Director of Animal Health hereby orders the cancelation or postponement of all competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps or other in-person events encouraging the gathering or commingling of waterfowl in Massachusetts until further notice.

The above notice does not prohibit the movement of domestic fowl or poultry into slaughter channels, including licensed live bird market sales facilities.

This Order will be rescinded on January 1, 2026, unless circumstances demand an extension at that time.

### **Special Notices:**

Due to the continuing US outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in domesticated and wild birds and in dairy cattle, Animal Health Officials from all six New England States are united in advising the following for agricultural fairs, competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps, or other in-person events that encourage the gathering or co-mingling of birds and/or cattle:

# **Avian species**

The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of domestic and wild waterfowl species and may recommend delaying or canceling domestic fowl or poultry shows. If events are held, best practices for biosecurity should be implemented.

# **Bovine species**

The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of any bovines, including both dairy and beef cattle, that have been present in any state at the time that state had a current outbreak of HPAI in cattle. Bovines that have been shipped from currently affected states in 2025 should not be allowed on the premises of New England fairs or shows. Moving to or from an affected state for any reason will void any New England Fair and Show Season Official Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (OCVIs) that have been issued for such cattle for the remainder of the 2025 season.

The USDA APHIS Veterinary Services Federal Order Requiring Testing for and Reporting of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in Livestock issued on April 24, 2024, remains in effect. It can be found on the USDA website:

A plan for managing lactating dairy cattle (LDC), including the handling of milk collected at the exhibition facility, should be in place for all fairs and shows where LDC will be on the premises. The state veterinarian's office can provide assistance developing a plan.

# All species

Animals of all species susceptible to HPAI are potentially subject to quarantine as ordered by the State Veterinarian if HPAI is detected on a premises where the animal is or was exhibited.

If HPAI is detected in cattle in any New England State, the Agreement between the New England State Veterinarians to allow the use of a single, fair and show season OCVI for New England animals being exhibited in New England will be voided. All exhibited animals would need to be accompanied by an OCVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of being checked in at the show premises and/or other state import requirements.

Best biosecurity practices for all species should be implemented.

Contact the state where animals will be exhibited for the latest updated information.

### General Requirements for all Species

Currently an Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) is required for each state for every animal movement across state lines. Animals crossing state lines must be properly (officially) identified per federal and state Animal Disease Traceability (ADT) requirements. Each state to which an animal travels needs to be contacted to verify that all traceability and movement permit requirements are met before shipping.

Recognizing that during the agricultural fair and show season exhibition animals may be moving to multiple states and locations within a state, the New England state veterinarians, working through the New England States Animal Agricultural Security Alliance (NESAASA), have developed a protocol to facilitate animal movement. The New England State Veterinarians have agreed to allow a show/fair certificate to be valid for the 2025 show season provided the OCVI complies with all federal and state ADT rules.

One OCVI may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England states (CT, \*ME, MA, \*\*NH, RI, and \*\*\*VT) when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved.

Note that \*ME, \*\*NH, and \*\*\*VT have additional requirements. Certificates of veterinary inspection in these states are valid for a shorter time and may have additional language, movement, and permit requirements. See details below.

For the 2025 Show and Fair Season, livestock animals being exhibited in New England states must have OCVIs that meet the following requirements

- CT. MA. ME. and RI: OCVIs issued on or after January 1, 2025, may be used for animals being shown at fairs and shows in CT, MA, ME, and RI through the 2025 show/fair season ending October 31, 2025. Special Note on The Big E, West Springfield, MA: All bovines must have official USDA RFID tags, \*CT and ME: An importation permit for exhibition animals is also required. Contact CT Dept. of Agriculture (860-713-2504) or ME State Veterinarian's Office (207-287-3701) for permits or questions. \*\*NH: Animals exhibited in NH must originate in a New England state and move on OCVIs issued on or after April 1, 2025, to participating NH fairs and shows from July 1 to October 31, 2025. Contact NH State Veterinarian's Office (603) 271-2404 for details and permits.
- \*\*\*VT: The fair season is defined as May 1- October 31, 2025. Contact the VT Animal Health Office (802- 828-2421) for specific import requirements and permits.

# Requirements, Continued:

- A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited.
- Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one OCVI with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
- An itinerary of the names and locations for each New England fair or show at which owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.
- A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the OCVI (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.
- o That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/ exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).
- o Electronic OCVIs must include this list of exhibition names, addresses, and dated in the "remarks and comments" section
- The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animals will be exhibited is to be used as the "destination" along with "New England Fair Season" on the OCVI form. In addition, "See attached list" or a similar statement directing Animal Health Officials or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary must be included.
- Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were physically on the show/fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check- in.
- Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2025 for health reasons it must have a new OCVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of the next interstate movement.
- Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

Remember: One certificate for shows in CT, MA, ME, NH, RI, and VT. Contact each state for specific requirements. Import permits are issued by each individual state and must be listed on the OCVI. The list of events, with dates and locations, where the animals are expected to be shown must accompany the OCVI. Use one certificate per species. All animals must be listed individually, with appropriate official ID numbers and physical descriptions.
